Hestia and Hades **share similarities** with each other. **Both** Olympian gods **share** their parents, Chronos and Rhea, and were saved by Zeus from Chronos' stomach. Roles are another way that Hestia and Hades are **alike**. **Both** gods are guardians. Hestia is the guardian of children and Hades is the guardian of the dead. Finally, Hestia and Hades **share** their outside placement from the Olympian gods' home of Mount Olympus.

Hestia has no throne and tends to the hearth. **Likewise**, Hades lives in the Underworld apart from his other brothers and sisters.

**While** Hestia and Hades share some commonalities, they certainly have their differences, too. One **contrast** between Hestia and Hades is wealth. Hestia tends the hearth and has no money **whereas** Hades has all the valuables found in Earth (precious stones and metals) and he is very wealthy. Hestia and Hades also have very **different** weapons. Hestia has no weapons **and yet** Hades has the invisibility cap. Lastly, Hestia and Hades **differ** in their personalities. Hestia is the most peaceful of the Olympians. **Conversely**, Hades is the ruler of the Underworld and has the ability to take lives away from people.
