#### **TRANSPORTATION**

For the remainder of the 20–21 school year, Amesbury Public Schools will not be charging bus fees. If you would like for your child to take the bus to and/or from school, the student must be registered. Please use this link: https://schools.amesburyma.gov/ to register your children for the bus.

You will be required to have your student's ID number available to register. Once students have registered, bus passes will be disseminated to the student's schools. It is very important that each student be registered.

Students are required to wear masks at all times on the bus. Students will be expected to sit in their assigned seats. Buses will be sanitized between routes.

### **HOW TO PICK A MIDDLE SCHOOL PRINCIPAL**

1. INTERESTED PARTIES SUBMITTED THEIR APPLICATIONS FOR THE POSITION, FIVE CANDIDATES WERE SELECTED.





2. CANDIDATES WERE THEN INTERVIEWED BY A COMMITTEE COMPRISING MEMBERS THE COMMUNITY AND STAFF.



3. THE COMMITTEE CHOSE TWO CANDIDATES, AND EACH ONE MET INDIVIDUALLY WITH THE AMS STAFF.









4. THE CANDIDATES THEN MET INDIVIDUALLY WITH THE AMS STUDENTS, WHO MADE UP THEIR OWN QUESTIONS.

5. FINALLY, THE CANDIDATES MET THE COMMUNITY, BOTH IN PERSON AT THE MIDDLE SCHOOL AND VIRTUALLY. THE AUDIENCE POSED QUESTIONS TO THE CANDIDATES, AND AT THE END OF THE SESSION, THEY WERE ASKED TO FILL OUT AND SUBMIT A FEEDBACK SURVEY. MRS. McANDREWS MET WITH EACH CANDIDATE SEPARATELY. THE ORIGINAL COMMITTEE RECONVENED AND GAVE ITS RECOMMENDATION TO MRS. McANDREWS, WHO WEIGHED THEIR DECISION AND THE COMMUNTIY FEEDBACK TO MAKE HER FINAL DECISION.

And thank you to these very special students who asked thoughtful, self-generated questions like these:

- What are the first three things you will focus on if you are hired as the new principal?
- How will you stop bullying at our school?
- For many students school, is the place where they socialize, because we haven't been in school for a while, how will you help students when we return to school?
- Will we still have clubs?

The process of choosing these students who would interview the candidates was as follows:

- ✓ Each team of teachers was asked to select 5 names of students.
- ✓ That group of 40 students was contacted and asked if they would participate.
- ✓ Of that 40 students, 21 said "Yes." ALL of these 21 showed up on time, on a day when they didn't have to be in school.

Ever wondered what a High School Guidance Counselor does or what the difference is between an Adjustment Counselor and a Guidance Counselor? We saw this sign outside the guidance office and got to wondering...so we asked. Thank you MaryBeth Exner and Rachael Dobbs for clarifying the difference. These folks have been a "virtual" godsend checking in with our students this year. Please see the following pages for some important information, especially helpful for current and incoming AHS students and families.

"The purpose of a guidance counselor is to guide and advise students throughout their four years of school." — MaryBeth Exner

- 1. How many students do you have as a case load typically each year?
- 2. How often do you see each student typically in a year?

  I see them a couple of times or more, depending on the needs of the student.
- 3. What other reasons besides helping them select their classes might you see them for?

  Guidance Counselors are advocates for students. We identify issues that affect school performance such as attendance rates. We work with students to develop skills such as organizational and time management abilities and effective study habits. We help students create plans to achieve academic and career goals. We collaborate with teachers, administrators, and parents to help students succeed. We come up with creative learning plans to provide opportunities for students. We work with community agencies to provide assistance to students and families as well as working as liaisons to provide internship opportunities to students.
- 4. Would you just check in with someone if you think they are having a bad day?

  All the time! We check in with students if they are having a bad day. Sometimes teenagers just need an advocate and someone to listen to. We are here for students and we are always willing to help them out. Usually if a student is upset about something that has gone on in their life, after they have talked it out and relaxed a bit, they are able to look out their problem and just need that guidance to reassure them that what they were feeling was real. Students in most cases then can look at their own issue and, with guidance from their counselor, can problem solve. We like to check in with students even when they're having a good day to congratulate them on success on an assignment, a presentation, or co-curricular activity in school and out.
- 5. Do you really get attached to some students?

  Building relationships is extremely important to guidance counselors. Being honest with students and developing a trust with them is a large part of our work. We are passionate about our school community, and the relationships that we have developed sometimes last for years as students progress through their lives. Receiving a note from a student updating me on their life after high school makes our days brighter. Hearing from students solidifies that we do make a difference in our students' lives.
- 6. Has the function of your job changed over the years? Is it easier or harder with the advent of the computer age?

  The job has changed somewhat Computers have made it easier and streamlined the process for communicating with

students and parents. For students, applying and researching colleges have helped students and made it easier for them to research and apply. Teenagers remain the same over the years and experience the same emotional and social challenges of growing up. The pandemic has definitely created an increase in mental health issues for students.

- 1. What is the difference between a guidance counselor and an adjustment counselor?

  Guidance counselors provide: College and career readiness, scholarship opportunities, resume building, guidance on military enrollment/interest, internship and work study opportunities, schedule changes, registration, etc.

  The school adjustment counselor provides social and emotional support to all students. If any student is having an issue that is interfering with their ability to be successful or function in the classroom, then a teacher or student may refer to me.
- 2. Do you need further schooling to become an adjustment counselor?
  Yes, you have to earn a Master's in counseling, psychology, mental health counseling or anything else covered under that umbrella. In addition, pass required tests through the state, in order to become a licensed school adjustment counselor.
- 3. What drew you to the field?

  I spent a lot of time in the mental health field and substance abuse field. I provided outreach, wrap around, and case management services to many communities in the North Shore. Travel was starting to become a lot, and I found myself always in the car. I knew I enjoyed working with children, adolescents, and their families, so I shifted my job search to working in the schools.
- 4. Do you have a regular caseload that you see each day or at regular intervals?

  Yes, I'm assigned to students who have an IEP with a social and emotional goal. In addition, I also have students who have 504 plans who may need additional emotional support. That being said, you do not have to have a formalized plan to access the school adjustment counselor. I'm available to assist all students who attend the high school.
- 5. Do you become really attached to students and worry about them on weekends?

  This past year has been difficult, but a year where I have started to be more aware of the importance of my self-care and boundaries. Of course I think about those students who are struggling and need a lot of support. But, in order for me to assist, support and guide them five days a week, I need to take care of myself on the weekends and reset. I need to have strong boundaries. But, yes, it is hard to not think of my students. I just need to make sure it does not consume me and take me away from my own family during my off-work hours.
- 6. Do you find yourself interacting with parents as well as teachers and staff?

  What really helps the students to be more consistent in taking care of their mental health is communicating consistently with teachers, staff, admin, and parents. When everyone involved with the student is aware of "the plan," they can remind and reinforce what we are working on in our sessions. On the flip side, it is helpful to get feedback from teachers and families as to what is working and what is not working so that we can adjust the plan or our focus when necessary.
- 7. What is a truly rewarding outcome of your association with a student?

  Seeing students being able to work through a situation by utilizing the coping skills and strategies they have identified as helpful to them. Also, hearing from teachers and families of the progress the student is making.



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
### Who is Jiji the Penguin?




