AEFI Autumn Evening of Giving

Monday evening, AEFI held its annual Autumn of Giving. During this event, AEFI awarded two \$5,000 grants to educators and awarded the Jordan Shay Grant in the amount of \$10,000. This year's recipients of the \$5,000 grants were Kate Bernadoni, for her grant entitled *Sending TEXTile Messages*, and Lisa Dupere and Katie Ankiewicz, for their grant entitled *Putting the Fun Back into Fundamentals*. The Jordan Shay \$10,000 grant was awarded to Bruce McBrien and Amy Mitchell, for their proposal in collaboration with John Mayer from the Carriage Museum on a grant entitled *Museum without Walls*. I am very proud of all of our educators that took time to submit grant applications and I am incredibly appreciative of AEEI for supporting our

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In addition to the grant awards, two Peter Gray Award recipients were announced. This award was designed to recognize others who have given so much to the care and education of our children. According to the AEFI website, *Peter Gray was truly a "friend to education." Peter served twice on the Amesbury School Committee from the 1980s until the early 90s. During that time he was the chairman as well as a member. It was during this time that a school committee member saw a need for the establishment of an educational foundation. In 1981, the Amesbury Educational Foundation, Inc. (AEFI) was created, and Pete soon became involved in the organization. He was a member, a board*

member and an officer of this organization until his death.

AEFI wasn't the only innovative venture of Peter Gray. In the late 70's he coached the seven and eight year-olds in Minor League baseball, a forerunner to T-Ball. He was an active Rotarian and helped organize Amesbury

Youth Rotary Basketball League (AYRBall) of which he was a charter member. Pete also helped build a branch of First and Ocean Bank within Amesbury High School. The bank branch thrives at the school to this day because of Pete's efforts.

His contributions to education and the quality of our schools were recognized by the then Amesbury Chamber of Commerce in 1994 when they named Peter Gray the Citizen of the Year.

Is it any wonder when asked to comment on their father, his son said, "Dad was a well-rounded citizen. He was a banker, farmer, baseball coach, school committee member, husband and father. He had friends of both collars and didn't have a bad hook shot when he felt the need to show it." His daughters used these words, "honest and true to oneself, perseverance, creative, able to bring together disparate opinions, ideas and agendas."

Friends, neighbors and colleagues characterized Pete as a loyal friend and mentor. He cared deeply for his family and the "community family." Pete saw the good in everyone. "He's the kind of person who, when gone, leaves a great void in all the places he touched."

The first recipient was Richard "Dick" McAllister, long time teacher and supporter of the Amesbury Public Schools. The second award was presented to Harry Lucier, one of the most memorable substitutes to walk the halls of the Amesbury Public Schools. Both Dick and Harry's family were there to accept these awards in their honor.

What were our teachers doing during Election Day?

The elementary and middle schools used the day to conduct parent conferences. The high school took the opportunity to provide some building based professional development for staff members. As we try to become more technologically savvy, the high school provided training to staff members in the use of Google and its various applications. There are teachers who are already using this tool as a method for students to turn in work and to be able to work collaboratively with one another. This training helped teachers further explore the Google applications.

Leadership team Meetings

Our leadership team meets twice a month for at least an hour and a half each time. We are working hard to make these meetings more meaningful and substantive and trying to avoid just reporting out information that could be easily transmitted via email. This week, our leadership team completed an evaluation calibration activity. Calibration involves making sure that our administrators that evaluate are giving common feedback and utilizing consistent approaches to conduct observations in the classrooms. For this meeting, we watched a fifteen minute video of a 7th grade math lesson and, using an observation template developed by one of our principals, we engaged in a conversation about what we identified as areas of strength as well as opportunities for growth for the observation feedback. The discussion was very thought-provoking and it helped our administrators understand areas that each person focuses on when conducting an observation. This provided us with the opportunity to further process how we can be more uniform in our observation write-ups for our teachers. Next month, we will complete this activity again utilizing a calibration tool developed by the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education.

Curriculum Facilitators Training

As I have reported in previous weekly communications, we continue to examine and revise our curriculum from grades prek-twelve in all content areas. This week, our curriculum facilitators (teachers that have been identified as leaders in different content/grade levels) got together with our trainer, Ronit Carter from McTighe and Associates to discuss the work for the next couple of months with staff members. Over the next couple of months, teachers will continue to work within content area groups to finalize transfer goals. At our next school committee meeting on November 21, Our Director of Teaching and Learning, Lyn Jacques, will present on the work that has been completed to date and will provide the school committee with an overview of the work that will continue over the next few years.

Our Girls' soccer team have continued their post season action with wins this week against Matignon on Monday afternoon (3-1) and against Austin Prep on Wednesday evening (2-0). The team has advanced to the finals against St. Mary's on Sunday afternoon.
